Which Advanced Program is Right for You?

BHS students can pursue rigorous coursework, prepare for college academics and potentially earn college credit. Each program described below can earn you college credit. Your teachers and counselor can help you determine the best blend of courses for you!

Focus on courses that play to their strength areas. 	 IB Students typically: Are dedicated, self-motivated students that desire rigorous program to prepare them for demanding university studies. Show interest in many subject areas – not just areas of strength. Utilize a collaborative team of IB mentors. Want to apply their learning to real world situations.

Students can pick a combination of AP, IB and CE courses. Combo students typically: Have time restrictions due to specific extra-curricular activities and have a highly specialized area of interest. Some IB Courses prepare students for the corresponding AP exam. AP Courses do not prepare students for the corresponding IB exam.
